### **Record breaking Call Volume**

For the 5th consecutive year, Picture Butte Emergency Services has responded to a record number of emergency events. 2021 saw a 42% increase in call volume with firefighters and paramedics responding to 1030 emergency events. This is the first time in department history that call volume has surpassed 1000 events.


### **Engine 31 Delivery**

Picture Butte Emergency Services took delivery of our new frontline fire engine in September of 2021. Manufactured by MetalFab Fire Trucks in Centreville, New Brunswick and delivered by Safetek Emergency Vehicles, this completed the 18-month capital project funded 50% by the Town of Picture Butte and 50% by Lethbridge County, Engine 31 will serve Picture Butte and Lethbridge County as the frontline fire engine.

### **Command Truck Replacement**

The command unit was replaced with a 2018 GMC Sierra, upfitted with lighting from Wired Tech Inc in Coaldale, AB and decaling by Zircon Graphics in Lethbridge, AB. The existing command unit was retained in the department fleet and redesignated as Utility 3 for support work on emergency scenes and logistics support for the department.

### **Emergency Services Funding**

Firefighting, rescue, bylaw, and emergency management services in the Town of Picture Butte are funded by the municipal tax support of the home and business owners within the town. We could not provide the services we do without the support of our community.

### **Lethbridge County Agreement**

The Town of Picture Butte provides fire and rescue services to Lethbridge County under a fee-for-service. Picture Butte Emergency Services has seen serving the citizens of Lethbridge County for over 70 years. Picture Butte Emergency Services protects the largest geographical district of Lethbridge County and provides assistance to our regional partners in all areas of the county.


#### **Alberta Health Services Contract**

Picture Butte Emergency Services has contracted our Basic Life Support ambulance to Alberta Health Services since the province assumed responsibility for emergency medical services in 2009. In 2021, the funding received from AHS covered 70% of the expenses to operate the EMS division.

#### **EMS Invoicing**

The other 30% of EMS operating expenses not covered by the AHS contract were recovered through invoicing for ambulance services. Invoices are sent for every ambulance call to either a provincial program like Alberta Blue Cross, a third-party health benefits provider or the patient directly. This allows the Picture Butte area to have a community-based EMS service without an impact on municipal taxes.


### Your Picture Butte firefighters are always training!

Picture Butte Emergency Services' firefighters and paramedics spent over 2500 hours collectively training in 2021!

Our members train at least once weekly, every Thursday night, with additional evenings and weekends during our recruit program and certification courses.

In 2021, we certified 11 firefighters to the NFPA 1051 Wildland Firefighter 1 standard and 5 firefighters to the NFPA 1006 Technical Rescue Awareness standard.

Three of our firefighters also completed training to enter the EMS Division. Congratulations to Firefighter Katie West on completing her Primary Care Paramedic certification and Probationary Firefighters Kathy Kelly and Kailey Jakober on completing their Medical First Responder program.

### Striving for a safe community through prevention and education

Picture Butte Emergency Services provides fire and life safety education through fire inspections, school visits and tours of the fire station, and fire extinguisher training. Our safety codes officers are able to educate building owners on their requirements under provincial fire code and the Safety Codes Act.

The Bylaw Services division provides education and enforcement of the Town of Picture Butte's bylaws. The Bylaw Officer also fills the role of Assistant Development Officer for the Town of Picture Butte and is the first point of contact for anyone looking to build and change property in the town that requires a development permit.

Officer Ryan Mosby regularly patrols the town to proactively identify bylaw infractions as well as responds to complaints received from the public. Anyone in Picture Butte that notices a bylaw infraction that requires attention by the Bylaw Officer please contact Officer Mosby as below.

### Bylaw Quick Tip

Town of Picture Butte Traffic Bylaw 852-16

Section 9.5 No person shall park a commercial vehicle or a heavy vehicle within the municipal boundaries of the Town in areas designated in the Land Use Bylaw as residential zones unless permitted under Section 9.3.

What this means is that commercial vehicles including semis (with or without trailer), vehicles over one tonne capacity or any heavy equipment cannot be parked in residential areas of the town. Truck parking is designated on town property east of the UFA.

### **Fire Station Construction**

After 3 years of extensive planning Phase 1 construction of our Fire Station expansion has been approved by Picture Butte Town Council. Construction will begin in the spring of 2022, adding 3 additional double-bays to the west side of the existing building. This addition will provide parking space for all the department's support apparatus that are currently stored outside as well as allow the larger apparatus to pull out into the parking lot instead of onto the highway. The new space will alleviate the main health and safety issue in the existing fire station by having adequate space around the apparatus for firefighters to work.





#### **Technical Rescue Team**

Through grant funding received at the request of a local business, Picture Butte Emergency Services will be implementing a Technical Rescue Team under our Fire Rescue Services Division. The Technical Rescue Team will provide additional services in rope, confined space, heavy vehicle and equipment, trench and water rescues. The Team will be operational and ready for deployment in 2022.

### **SCBA Replacement**

Another scheduled capital project taking place in 2022 is the replacement of our self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA). This equipment is replaced on a 15-year cycle and is being upgraded from a 30-minute to 45-minute breathing air system. This equipment is vital to the work our firefighters do on the scene of a fire.
